

# 1 Collection of Historical Scientific Instruments in the Science Center

Harvard's collection contains over 20,000 artifacts that have been integral to the fields of astronomy, navigation, medicine, and more, from the 13th century to the present.

# 2 The River Houses

The Harvard House system creates a robust residential life—98% of undergrads live on campus. Built in the 1930s, the River Houses were inspired by the college system at Oxford and Cambridge.

# 3 Sever Hall Archway

Take a moment with a friend to play a game of telephone inside this architectural feat: whisper on one side of the arch and the sound will return clearly on the other side.

# 4 Sunken Garden in Radcliffe Yard

Featuring a bubbling fountain and delicate flowers, this hidden gem is the perfect spot for a moment of serenity.

# 5 Solomon Gate

At the cross-section between Houghton Library and the humanities center, it is no surprise that Solomon Gate features a bit of wonder. Look closely to see the magical details on the gate, inspired by children's literature.

# 6 Harvard Square Cemetery/Old Burying Ground

The final resting place for many Harvard presidents, professors, and people from all walks of life. Here you can see the gravestones of many commemorated on Harvard buildings or across Massachusetts's maps.

# 7 Richard A. and Susan F. Smith Campus Center

The Smith Campus Center is the center of student life, from the Box Office to the Harvard Undergraduate Association to the Collaborative Commons. Students can enjoy a beautiful view of Cambridge from the 10th floor.

# 8 Forbes Pigment Collection at the Harvard Art Museums

Featuring the rarest colors throughout history—including a blue worth more than gold—the pigment collection serves as a teaching tool, an invaluable resource, and even as a work of art itself.

# 9 Lampoon Building

The Lampoon is the center of comedy at Harvard, publishing the world's oldest humor magazine, with alumni including Conan O'Brien, B. J. Novak, and John Updike. In order to maintain the building's intrigue, undergraduate students not in the organization cannot enter the building until their final year.

# 10 John Harvard Statue

Located in front of University Hall at the heart of campus, it is also known as "The Statue of Three Lies." Spot the inaccuracies!

# Memorial Hall/Sanders Theatre/Annenberg Hall

From a dining hall to a classroom to a concert venue, Memorial Hall is a catch-all for undergraduate life at Harvard.

# 12 Harvard Hall

One of the oldest buildings in historic Harvard Yard, Harvard Hall once stored the University's collections. Now it hosts some of the most charming classrooms on campus.

# 13 Schlesinger Library

Once the library for Radcliffe College and now the center of the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study, Schlesinger Library celebrates the lives and scholarship of women past and present.

### 14 Carpenter Center for the Visual Arts/ Harvard Film Archive

The Harvard Film Archive, located in the basement of the Carpenter Center, hosts public screenings and regularly invites filmmakers to discuss their work.

# 15 John W. Weeks Bridge

A beautiful spot to watch the sunset, students have a tradition of jumping off the bridge into the Charles before they graduate. The bridge also contains a hidden passageway beneath it, constructed to carry steam to Harvard Business School.
