Spend five days exploring the northern region of Tasmania, including Cradle Mountain National Park, See the unique Tasmanian Devil and learn about the history of the region. Continue to Hobart and board the 72-passenger expedition ship Coral Discoverer for a seven-night cruise to the farthest reaches of Tasmania's rugged coast. A true open-ocean expedition ship, Coral Discoverer's shallow draught and maneuverability allow her an unmatched ability to enter the shallow bays and inlets of Tasmania's otherwise virtually inaccessible West coast. Become immersed in Tasmania's breathtaking National Parks and dramatic scenery, abundant wildlife and history. Guided by an expert Expedition Team, there is no finer way to experience Tasmania's remote southern coastline than by expedition ship, and no other itinerary with the ability to capitalize on the unique experiences Tasmania offers.

# A LITTLE MORE TO IT

This is a fast-paced, moderately strenuous program that is at times physically demanding and busy, with considerable walking at some sites. Shore excursions range from a half-day to all day, with the balance of the time spent onboard cruising to the next destination.

Travel on land will be by air-conditioned motor coach, with most drives no more than one hour. January 13 will involve a total of 5 ½ hours driving across the heart of Tasmania via the scenic Lyell Highway. The drive will include a 3 hour segment, a visit to Lake Saint Clair, and then a 2 ½ hour drive to Hobart.

During the cruise there will be excursions by Zodiacs, which require the ability to step from the ship to the Zodiac and back again in open water (the ship's crew will be there to assist you). Walking tours can be as long as 2–3 hours, covering one to two miles, and will range from walks in town to a few relatively strenuous nature walks over uneven, sometimes muddy and hilly terrain.

# Harvard Study Leader



Born in London, Andrew Berry has a degree in zoology from Oxford University and a PhD in evolutionary genetics from

Princeton University. He was a Harvard Junior Fellow, and is currently a lecturer on Organismic & Evolutionary Biology at Harvard. Combining the techniques of field biology with those of molecular biology, Berry's work has been a search for evidence at the DNA level of Darwinian natural selection.

He has published on topics as diverse as giant rats in New Guinea, mice on Atlantic islands, aphids from the Far East, and the humble fruit fly. At Harvard, he currently co-teaches courses on evolutionary biology, on the development of evolutionary thinking, and on the physical basis of biological systems. He also teaches a Harvard study abroad summer program based at Queen's College, Oxford that combines the history of science with a review of current thought in evolutionary biology. He has given lectures on evolutionary topics to popular audiences all over the worldfrom Ankara to the Antarctic.

Berry is the editor of a collection of the writings of Alfred Russel Wallace, the Victorian biologist who, with Charles Darwin, co-discovered natural selection; and the author, with James D. Watson, of an account of the history and impact of modern genetics published to mark the 50th anniversary of the discovery of the double helix. As an educator and popularizer, he seeks to demystify the most important and most misinterpreted of all biological ideas, evolution.

Andrew plans to give lectures on the following topics: *Islands & Evolution; Tasmanian Devils, Conservation & Disease;* and *Using DNA to Unravel the Early Human History of Australia.*

# **Cradle Mountain**

Spend the morning at the Trowunna Wildlife Sanctuary. See and learn about a range of marsupials, birds and reptiles that are native to Tasmania. Travel south and settle into the scenic Cradle Mountain Lodge on the edge of the picturesque Lake Saint Clair. Over dinner take in the dramatic views of the Rugged Jewel, Cradle Mountain. *Peppers Cradle Mountain Lodge (B.L.D)* 

# SUNDAY, JANUARY 12 Cradle Mountain

Following a morning lecture, explore the beauty of Cradle Mountain-Lake Saint Clair National Park. Enjoy a hike around picturesque Dove Lake. Towards the southern end of Dove Lake enter a magnificent cool temperate rainforest known as the Ballroom Forest. Ancient myrtle-beech trees festooned in moss tower majestically from a moss strewn forest floor. The effect is stunning. and reminiscent of an ancient cathedral. Visit the Tasmanian Devil Sanctuary to learn about conservation efforts for the Tasmanian Devil, the Spottedtail Ouoll and the Eastern Ouoll. Peppers Cradle Mountain Lodge (B,L,D)

# MONDAY, JANUARY 13 Hobart

This morning visit the famed Wilderness Wall, an ambitious art project by Greg Duncan. The beautifully carved wall set out in relief sculpture depicts the history, hardship and perseverance of the people in the Central Highlands and pays homage to the individuals who settled and protected the Tasmanian Highlands. Later today travel along the scenic Lyell Highway across the heart of Tasmania to Hobart. Check in to Australia's first dedicated art hotel, Henry Jones Hotel, where

waterfront warehouses have been thoughtfully reimagined into stately, indulgent suites. Located in the Hunter Street precinct, the hotel blends modernity with an industrial past. *Henry Jones Hotel (B,L,D)* 

# TUESDAY, JANUARY 14 Hobart

Spend time at the Mawson Huts Museum, a celebration of an Australlasian Antarctic expedition lead by Douglas Mawson. Enjoy an unforgettable afternoon at Mt. Wellington. View the Organ Pipes, one of the most distinctive features on Mt. Wellington, and form a magnificent sight along the track which runs just below their base. The dolerite rock that comprises the towering, columnar cliffs was formed when Tasmania was in the process of separating from Antarctica during the final stages of the breakup of Gondwana. Visit the top of Mt. Wellington, where the landscape offers an incredible show. Return to the hotel and enjoy dinner independently at one of Hunter Street precinct's many fine restaurants. # Board Coral Discoverer

Learn about the cutting-edge art on display at the world-famous Museum of Old and New Art. Located outside of Hobart, the museum is encased in a threelevel subterranean cave cut into 240-million-year-old Triassic-era



sandstone on the Derwent River. Later this afternoon, embark the *Coral Discoverer* and enjoy the captain's welcome reception and dinner. *Coral Discoverer (B,L,D)* 

# THURSDAY, JANUARY 16 Woodbridge / Recherche Bay

Meet 'The Girls' at Australia's only organic sheep cheesery, Grandvewe Cheeses. Taste gold medal winning cheese and view the process of cheese making from paddock to palate. Following lunch, visit the Wooden Boat Centre at picturesque Franklin. *Coral Discoverer (B,L,D)*

# **Adventure Bay**


# Coral Discoverer
