Richard F. Thomas, George Martin Lane Professor of the Classics and Harvard College Professor, was educated at the University of Auckland and at the University of Michigan. He began his academic career at Harvard as assistant and associate professor, and then moved on to the University of Cincinnati and Cornell University before returning to Harvard. In the Department of the Classics he has served as both chair and director of

graduate studies, and now chairs the graduate placement committee and the seminar on "The Civilizations of Greece and Rome." He has served as director of the American Philological Association and as trustee of the Vergilian Society, of which he is currently incoming president. In his teaching, Professor Thomas is interested in all aspects of Greek and Roman literature and culture, and he is also much occupied by the reception of those cultures at various moments in the tradition of European and other civilizations.


Albert Leonard, Jr., lecturer for co-sponsor Archaeological Institute of America, is Professor Emeritus in both the Department of Classical Archaeology and the Department of Near Eastern Studies at the University of Arizona. An archaeologist who specializes in the social impact of interregional trade among the ancient cultures of the Mediterranean, he has directed

excavations around the Mediterranean (in Italy, Greece, Portugal, Egypt, Cyprus, Israel, and Jordan), co-founded an international field school in archaeological methods near Segesta, and published the results of this research in six books and more than 150 articles.

Cruise aboard the beautiful yacht Variety Voyager for seven nights of fascinating port calls and insightful presentations by Harvard Professor Richard Thomas. Begin in Rome with an exploration of some of the Eternal City's innumerable Hadrian's extraordinary villa at
Tivoli, a World Heritage site. Once
aboard ship, cruise past Stromboli
for a thrilling nighttime view of the
volcano's constant activity, then
visit Taormina's Greco-Roman
theater, back-dropped by stunning
Mt. Etna; the Aeolian Islands of
Vulcano and Lipari, part of the
volcanic archipelago between
Vesuvius and Etna; the medieval
aerie of Erice, perched high above
the sea in northwestern Sicily; and
Segesta's stunning Doric temple.

Sail on to the Amalfi Coast, designated a World Heritage "cultural landscape," for visits to fabled Capri, beautiful Amalfi, and scenic Ravello. Fine wine, delicious regional cuisine, and unhurried excursions make this a memorable adventure in *Bell'Italia*!

Home / Rome, Italy

Depart on an overnight flight to Rome. Upon arrival, transfer to your hotel. Gather for a welcome reception and orientation.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 18

Rome

Explore the Eternal City on your choice of excursion: (1) Visit the newly reopened Borghese Gallery's fabulous sculptures and paintings and enjoy a stroll along the exciting Via Veneto, home to the Café de Paris and Harry's Bar (immortalized in the film La Dolce Vita) and the American Embassy, or (2) explore Rome's Jewish ghetto, the Museo Nazionale Romano's splendid archaeological collections, and the popular Campo dei Fiori, Rome's oldest market. Enjoy time in the afternoon for independent exploration before a festive welcome dinner in a popular trattoria. Grand Hotel de la Minerve (B,D)

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 19

Rome / Anzio

Depart Rome for the countryside where Emperor Hadrian built his exquisite villa in the 2nd century AD. A UNESCO World Heritage site, the villa was a sprawling complex that included palaces, temples, baths, and living quarters for court officials, bodyguards, and servants. After lunch, visit the Renaissance gardens of Villa d'Este, renowned for its terraced landscapes and magical

fountain displays. In the late afternoon, board *Variety Voyager* in Anzio. *Variety Voyager* (B,L,D)

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 20

At Sea

Enjoy a relaxing day at sea en route to Sicily, enjoying tours of the ship and presentations by your study leaders. Tonight, as *Variety Voyager* cruises past the volcanic island of Stromboli, find a place on deck to watch the night sky lit up by the volcano's constant activity. *Variety Voyager* (B,L,D)

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 21

Taormina

With its beautifully situated 2nd-century Greco-Roman theater overlooking the sea and steaming Mt. Etna in the background, Taormina has long attracted visitors. Enjoy time to explore the town before driving to the flanks of the volcano for a private al fresco lunch in a family-owned vineyard. Variety Voyager (B,L,D)

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 22

Vulcano / Lipari

The Aeolian Islands are a volcanic archipelago north of Sicily. At Vulcano see the steaming fumaroles and, if you wish, immerse yourself in the warm, therapeutic mud baths. Lipari, largest of the Aeolians, was infested with pirates until the late 19th century. Visit the archaeology museum, with exhibits dating from the Neolithic to the Classical period and one of the most complete collections of miniature Greek

theatrical masks in the world. Variety Voyager (B,L,D)

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 23

Erice / Segesta

From the ramparts of the medieval village of Erice, atop 2,500-foot-high Mt. Erice, enjoy a sweeping panorama of western Sicily and the Tyrrhenian Sea. Wend your way down a maze of cobbled streets to the town's two castles and numerous churches. Then continue to the remarkably well preserved 5th-century Doric Greek temple at Segesta, which overlooks the beautiful Golfo di Castellammare. *Variety Voyager (B,L,D)*

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 24

Amalfi / Ravello

Cruise to the picturesque Amalfi Coast located south of Sorrento and anchor in Amalfi Bay. Today's options include an exploration of Ravello, a UNESCO World Heritage site, or an excursion to Naples and Herculaneum. Visit the Rufolo Villa, built by a wealthy Ravello patrician, mentioned in Boccaccio's Decameron, and believed to have inspired Richard Wagner's stage design of his opera Parsifal. Also admire the famous "Terrace of Infinity" gardens of Villa Cimbrone and enjoy an afternoon at leisure. Alternatively, spend the day in Naples, whose historic city center is a UNESCO World Heritage site, and the Roman ruins of Herculaneum,





which, like Pompeii, was buried during the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in AD 79. Variety Voyager (B,D)

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 25

Capri

Cruise along Capri's dramatic cliffs for a view of the iconic Faraglioni rock formations, three craggy pillars rising from the sea, before arriving at Marina Grande. Take the funicular up to cosmopolitan Capri town for a guided tour of the ruins of Emperor Tiberius's Villa Jovis and an introduction to the village, followed by free time to have lunch on your own, sample the chic boutiques on the piazza, and perhaps visit the gardens of Villa San Michele, created by Swedish physician Axel Munth. This evening enjoy a festive farewell dinner aboard ship. Variety Voyager (B,D)

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 26

Anzio (Disembark) / Home This morning, disembark in Anzio and transfer to Rome's Fiumicino Airport for flights home. (B)





DETAILS

Activity Level: Moderate

WHAT TO EXPECT

This is a moderately strenuous program that is at times physically demanding and busy, and includes navigating uneven terrain at archaeological sites, walking on cobblestone pavement in small towns, and standing for up to two hours in museums or other sites. In some locations, such as at archaeological ruins, stairs are unavailable or do not have handrails. In addition, travelers must be able to board the ship via a metal gangplank with rope handrails and get into/out of bobbing tenders for shore excursions. Daytime temperatures during the trip will range from the high 70s to the low 80s F, with a chance of rain. Early mornings and evenings will be cooler, with temperatures in the low 60s. Participants with medical issues and/or dietary restrictions must make them known to us well before departure, and impairments regarding mobility must be disclosed prior to booking. - Visit the steaming fumaroles of Vulcano and the former pirate haven of Lipari, two of the fascinating Aeolian Islands north of Sicily.
- Drop anchor at two of the most charming and picturesque spots along the Italian coast: Amalfi and Capri.

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
VARIETY VOYAGER





The Variety Voyager is a state-of-theart yacht that accommodates just 72 passengers in 36 cabins. Guests will enjoy her sleek lines and ample deck space. Cabins and public areas are finished with warm fabrics, rich marbles, and fine wood paneling. Cabins have oversized portholes or double windows, en suite facilities with marble floors, individually controlled air-conditioning, TV/DVD, and access to WiFi when in satellite range. Throughout the ship, guests have unobstructed views of the ocean and of the ports visited, as well as the services of a friendly and professional crew of 28. There are opportunities to dine both inside the yacht and on the deck, and to enjoy the shaded sun deck lounge bar, the Internet corner and library, and the mini-spa with massage room, sauna, steam room, and fitness equipment.

Airfare U.S. domestic and international airfare is not included in the program cost. Round-trip, economy-class airfare between New York and Rome is approximately \$1,250 as of November 2013 and is subject to change without notice. In order to give you as much flexibility as possible with the variety of air travel options available, you are free to make your own air arrangements for this program.
